

The Parish Council is excited to announce that work is beginning on the playground at Fir Tree Close, with new multiplay centre-pieces replacing the existing units, within a new layout which will incorporate some other fun new features.

Unfortunately no pain, no gain, so the playground will be closed during the installation period, which is likely to be at least 4 weeks - updates will be posted on Facebook and the Parish Council website at https://kbsparishcouncil.org.uk/playground-upgrade/ where you will also be able to view details of the new design.

The design includes:

- · New paths linking the equipment;
- A replacement junior multi-play piece which will be located in the centre;
- A new toddler zone including a replacement multiplay piece;
- A basket swing;
- · A sensory area;
- · A new agility trail;
- Relocation of the seating to make it more easily accessible.

It was a real sadness for many in the village to hear of the death of David Warr in November after a short illness.

David, Jean and their children Ian and Clare moved to Kingston Bagpuize in 1994 making many friends as they became involved in numerous village activities.

A successful architect and ultimately senior partner of Oxford Architects, David helped and advised village residents about the early large planning applications, he also contributed to various village projects and was highly appreciated as he helped many to become computer literate. In 2018 he joined the Parish Council and using his planning and architectural knowledge ensured that the new Jubilee Pavilion for the cricket and football clubs was completed in 2022.



After his retirement from Oxford Architects David gave much time to 2 charities, first as Chair of The Oxfordshire Association for the Blind and latterly as a Trustee of the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust. First and foremost, devoted to his family, he loved music and was an enthusiastic night sky watcher. A charming and remarkable man who is much missed. Virginia Grant

News from The Parish Council

Summary for 2nd December Parish Council Meeting

- At the December 2nd meeting, the council tackled a variety of community matters, reflecting its ongoing commitment to improving local amenities and addressing residents' concerns. Key highlights included approving a robust objection response to a planning application for 249 new dwellings at Spring Hill, spearheaded by planning consultants MDP.
- Progress on the upgraded playground project was discussed, with inclusive design changes approved for installation in February, ensuring facilities cater for all children.
- Financial stewardship was also a focal point, with the council reviewing payments, receipts, and proposing a budget for 2025-26. With a precept of £127,000 anticipated for the next fiscal year, the council aims to balance maintenance needs with future community projects.
- Looking ahead, the council is preparing to recruit an 'outdoor officer' to oversee land and property and make checks, ensuring safety and upkeep.
- The community is invited to get involved by participating in the Neighbourhood Development Plan, aiming for completion by March 2025.

At the January 13th meeting the council considered a range of issues.

- District Cllr Jill Rayner confirmed that the Joint Local Plan 2041 has been submitted. South and Vale have demonstrated that there is already sufficient housing allocation for the next 15 years.
- The Lioncourt Development site (east of Kingston Bagpuize) has been purchased by Barratt Homes, David Wilson Homes with Sovereign Network Group and the Parish Council had the first of regular monthly meetings with DWH regarding the detailed proposals for the site.
- The proposed budget was considered and the council unanimously agreed to ratify it. The precept rises to £127,000.00 which gives an increase of £8.35 to £69.97 per annum for a Band D property.
- The Fir Tree Close playground will be closed for approximately 5 weeks from January 27th while the new play equipment is installed.
- Tree work, as indicated by a tree survey, is due to begin on 49 trees on parish council land.
- · Council approved the job description for a new Outdoor Officer to be advertised in KBS News
- The Council's next meeting is February 3rd, 2025, it's hoped residents will attend to share their views.

Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor Neighbourhood Development Plan

December 16th

- The meeting of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) Steering Group was held at the Tearoom in Kingston Bagpuize House. The session focused on refining the settlement boundary, with a new map outlining key features such as the conservation area, parkland, and infrastructure. The group also discussed local growth and the inclusion of historical maps in the NDP submission to highlight the scale of development since 2011.
- Updates on the NDP grant application process were shared, including plans to explore alternative consultancy options to address delays.



- Further progress was made on drafting policies unique to Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor. Topics
- included village character and heritage, green spaces and biodiversity, and the adequacy of amenities
- to support a population that has doubled in recent years. Plans for infrastructure improvements,
- including arts and culture facilities, and future uses for the Scout Hut, were also considered.
- The Steering Group welcomes community involvement in shaping the NDP, which will define the parish's future development.

January 14th

- The meeting of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) Steering Group was held at the Tearoom in Kingston Bagpuize House to advance the planning process.
- Key updates included progress on defining the village's settlement boundary, incorporating the Conservation Area, Millennium Green, and Heritage Parkland. Detailed notes explaining the mapped boundaries will be included in the plan.
- Discussions also covered updates on village character and history, with suggestions to reference Longworth and consider adding notable unlisted buildings, like the Old School (now the Scout Hut).
- The group highlighted the rapid expansion of the village without a corresponding increase in amenities, emphasizing the need for updated infrastructure and enhanced services.
- Environmental and sustainability initiatives were also reviewed, focusing on increasing woodland
- · cover and biodiversity as part of local and national targets.
- A comprehensive green spaces map is being prepared to document accessible areas and their benefits to the community.
- Discussions touched on arts and culture funding opportunities and the importance of collaborative tools like Google Drive to facilitate the group's work.
- The next meeting is scheduled for February 11th 2025, in the Tearoom at Kingston Bagpuize House, continuing the vital work of shaping the village's future. Residents are most welcome to attend.



Recipe of the month

OVEN BAKED OMELETTE - An easy Evening Meal



Ingredients (Serves 2)

- 4 rashers of Streaky Bacon, rinded and chopped;
- 1/2 an onion, skinned and chopped;
- · 2 level teaspoons of seasoned flour;
- · 1 tablespoon of chopped parsley;
- 4 eggs;
- 1/4 pint of milk;
- 4 ounces of cheese, grated.



Preparation

- **1.** Fry the chopped bacon and drain it with a slotted spoon leaving the fat in the frying pan.
- 2. Put the bacon into a deep pie plate.
- **3.** Add the chopped onion to the bacon fat in the pan and fry until golden.
- 4. Add the flour and stir.
- **5.** Spread this mixture over the bacon and sprinkle with chopped parsley.
- **6.** Whisk together the eggs and milk, then pour them over the onion mixture and evenly sprinkle the grated cheese on top.
- **7.** Bake in the centre of the oven, at a temperature of 170°C, for 40 minutes until browned and firm.
- 8. Serve with a portion of chips and enjoy.

Restaurant Review



The Punter, Osney



Recently we took an 18 minute bus ride on the S6 to the last stop at Osney Island for a visit to the Punter. We arrived at the front door after a pleasant 5 minute walk along the canal on a blowy Saturday lunchtime for a 2 pm table. We had

booked the table via their app and had to leave credit card details. They have a £10 per head charge for no-shows, which does not seem unreasonable when margins in the catering trade are so tight.

There are three easy steps up into the pub. The fire was lit in the lower part of the restaurant area, down another couple of easy steps. There is a street level access to the lower area, which they would no doubt open if you needed assistance.

It wasn't that busy, and some tables were already leaving. A couple of larger groups appeared, and it was busier when we left just after 3pm, than it had been when we arrived.

There were a good variety of table sizes. They were attractively done in scrubbed wood with old fashioned chairs. Loose rugs and lots of art finish off a cosy look.

There are three real ales. The XT was very good. A carafe of tap water was served on request. The wine list was concise.

We shared a pea leek and truffle scotch egg to start. The egg was slightly runny, the outside lovely and crisp, and the herb mayonnaise went well with it.

I had the black bean and sweet potato burger for main. It looked a little plain on the plate, but the texture of the burger was good, and the kimchi added some spice, along with quite a lot of ginger. The truffle and parmesan fries did the job. My companion had the crushed potatoes and tofu. The tofu was cooked nicely, and the mint in the potatoes worked very well with the gremolata on the green vegetables. Quantities were quite sufficient, and the service was very attentive. We didn't see any puddings being served, so can't comment other than that they were a bit pricey.

It is a traditional pub; what makes it different is that it only serves vegetarian and vegan food. Don't let that put you off; the quality is very high. Even the most diehard carnivore should give it a try. Overall, one to recommend. By Wilrich, two KBS foodies



Magnus Macfarlane **Natural History Museum**



How many times have you been? Often, I ask you, have you ever seen or done this? Today's question is how many times this year will you visit the Natural History Museum. It works on so many levels for all ages. My last visit was an architectural tour.

The Museum has a striking glass and iron roof, a bit like a railway station. It had always been a bit leaky. As part of the ongoing refurbishment, the roof was repaired. It is now an extremely warm and welcoming building, a particularly good place to go at this time of year.

Architects Dean and Woodward employed the O'Shea Brothers from Ireland to do the decorative stonework. These colourful characters are highly skilled artisans but considered country bumpkins by the University Council of Fellows. This led to some conflict. Here's three wee stories about the O'Shea's.


The front entrance is truly spectacular, culminating at the top in the middle with an angel holding a bible in one hand and a dividing cell in the other.

Facing the front of the building you will see various degrees of decoration around the sides of the arched windows. This is partly because of budgetary restraint and partly politics. One window just to the right of the entrance features cats. Charles Darwin was making significant contributions to scientific thought at the time. This window was originally carved with monkeys, but the fellows protested that this was far too controversial and so it was that they had to be changed - into very unusual looking cats. There were many disputes about what was carved and decorated and, indeed, when the funds ran out the O'Shea Brothers offered to carry on for free, but the fellows thought they were "defacing the building" with unauthorised work.

Surrounding the main hall are statues of famous scientists, including Darwin.

The O'Shea's were under strict instructions to make this non-controversial, as plain as possible. They complied. However, if you look around the back of the capital of this pillar you will see a monkey!

Many of the bases are also carved, one features snakes. If you look closely, you will see that the snakes have ears. The story goes that the fellows noted this, however as there are "no snakes in Ireland", the O'Shea's would have been unaware of this, so they let it go. Who do you think had the last laugh?



'Their Stories'

A new book that tells the stories of the 90 people killed, on or in Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor, Longworth and Hinton Waldrist in wars of the 20th century.

'Their Stories' is a book by Rob Belk, who lived locally for many years. The book constitutes a veritable guide to the Wars of the 20th Century and a lasting tribute to those who served.

It is the story of the main wars of the 20th Century and of 90 individuals connected to our three villages who perished in the conflicts. The book intertwines personal accounts with historical 'Roads to War' context.

The narrative begins with the Boer War (1899–1902), highlighting early signs of total warfare. It recounts the bravery of local men and their experiences in battle – including the story of one man who, after death, led his men out of the mountains and into legend. It also reflects on the civilian toll, guerrilla tactics, and early modern military strategies.

The focus then shifts to World War I (1914–1918), exploring the lives of 48 villagers who fought and died and provides detailed indexes of these men and women, noting their ages,

ranks, causes of death, and familial ties. Key battles such as the Somme and Ypres are contextualized through War Diaries and we learn of one local man who made a home-run from a POW camp in Poland and another who was sent to Russia to persuade them to 'stay in the war' after the 1917 revolution, saving countless British lives.

World War II (1939–1945) follows, chronicling the stories of 40 individuals, including local men and 10 airmen from Canada, America and Australia, who died in plane crashes on and over the villages. The book delves into casualties and pivotal events, from early bombing raids to the eventual Allied victory, shedding light on the human cost of technological advancements, rushed training, design flaws and V2 rockets. It also discusses the local and global consequences of the war.

The final sections reflect on the Cold War's conflicts and Longworth's unwitting link with American Cold War politics. It also covers the enduring importance of Remembrance. The story of the creation of the War Memorial in Kingston Bagpuize underscores the book's central theme: to give life to those who gave life, that they no longer be just 'names on stones'.

Rich in historical detail and personal narratives, 'Their Stories' honours the humanity of those who fought, while providing a broader understanding of the wars that shaped the 20th century. It stands as both a tribute and a reminder of the lasting impact of war. It is fitting that it is published in the year of the 80th anniversary of VE Day.

It includes some 250 illustrations and can be ordered on Amazon at a cost of £24.99.



From our MP Charlie Maynard

I hope you and your family are having a wonderful start to 2025. It has now been a little over six months since I was elected as your MP. I have a full team in place and I'm very excited for everything we can accomplish for Witney this year - both locally and in Westminster.

Since the start of the year, I have been getting stuck into the new Water (Special Measures) Bill in Parliament. I was delighted to be one of the 17 MPs appointed to the cross-party Bill Committee.

It is our job to work together to scrutinise the detail of the Bill and suggest ways to improve it where we can. As a long-time campaigner for better water regulation (before becoming your MP), I certainly didn't hold back! In

total I helped bring 44 additional proposals to the table, which I thought would toughen up sanctions on water companies when they are responsible for pollution and help clean up lakes, rivers and seas across the country.

The Committee was an eye-opening experience for a new MP and certainly a learning curve. I really appreciated the positive way in which MPs from all parties engaged on this important issue.

Other issues I have focussed on recently in Parliament include:

The impact of the new housing the Government have proposed for West Oxfordshire, and highlighting the new infrastructure we will need locally to go alongside this. In particular, I was pleased to secure a debate on the need to rebuild the trainline that previously linked Oxford and Carterton, to alleviate congestion on local roads.

The economy and cost of living pressures: I spoke in the debate on the budget and, through my role on the Business and Trade Select Committee, have been able to engage with the Employment Rights Bill. Ahead of the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) (Assisted Dying) bill, I hosted a public debate at the Corn Exchange in Witney. I fully appreciated the strength of feeling and well-made points on both sides of this sensitive issue, and wanted to listen to these before casting my vote back in Parliament. Thank you to everyone who attended and who has written to me about this over the last few months.

I also met with many constituent farmers who came to Westminster to share their views with me about changes to inheritance tax rules.

Closer to home, I have been out and about across the constituency meeting businesses, charities and residents' groups. Thank you to everyone who has kindly had me to visit.

Among them were: Pennyhooks Farm, where I was deeply impressed to see the work that Lydia Otter and her team do with young people and adults on the autistic spectrum.

AirTanker at their Hub base on station at RAF Brize Norton, where I learnt how the military and commercial aviation sectors integrate with the Royal Air Force.

Woodgreen School in Witney, where I had a fascinating Q & A session with pupils – covering everything from the future of the economy to sewage in our rivers and the cost of local housing.

The residents of Bablock Hythe, who met me to talk about the devastating impact of local flooding. Staff at Witney Royal Mail, who took the time to speak to me during the incredibly busy pre-Christmas period.

LAND TO THE NORTH OF SPRINGHILL

Update on the Outline planning application for up to 249 dwellings (P24/V2357/0)

Unfortunately, this issue of the KBS News will have gone to press before the District Council reaches its decision, for or against, this planning application, but by the time you read it the decision should be known. Over forty householders from the village objected to the application – mainly, but not entirely, from Beggars Lane and Springhill. The Parish Council engaged a planning Consultant, MDP, who submitted an objection letter on the 25th November 2024, and Longworth Parish Council followed suit. The Longworth Council had the



benefit of reading MDP's objection letter and concluded that 'They fully support all the points of objection raised and believe this site to be thoroughly unsuitable for any development, especially on the scale proposed.' Concluding that 'The application is unanimously rejected by the Parish Council and it strongly objects to this application and any development of this site.'.

Key points made by MDP were that the site is 'Not a suitable location for housing development, with particular regard to local and national planning policy' as it is NOT supported by either of these policies, nor does it comply with the Council's 'Plan-led spatial pattern for housing growth', and would materially affect the character, biodiversity and appearance of the locality – factors disputed by the relevant officers. e.g. the Forestry Officer, the Environmental Protection Team and the Heritage Officer - on the other hand, numerous valid reservations were flagged up by the Vale's Urban Design Officer. The District Council itself, in its pre-application advice, made the point that 'The proposal is an unallocated site beyond the built-up area of the village extending into the open countryside, which does not accord with the District's strategy for housing growth. The proposal is therefore contrary to the Vale of White Horse Development Plan 2031 ... There has been no substantive change to the planning policy environment, nor any material change in terms of constraints on the ground or housing land supply position, to justify any departure from this conclusion ...'

Further points of objection included inadequate access to the site, given the perceived dangers of access from the A420 to the Faringdon Road and the road to Charney Bassett; the additional pressure that would be put on already overburdened local services 'especially in light of the large development already due to take place in (to the east of) Kingston Bagpuize'.

The Parish Council's response to the Nicholas King Homes application is covered in the MDP Report which is listed on the Parish Council website and detailed information is available on the Vale Planning Portal.

It's 25 years since 11 ladies from a Yorkshire Dales Women's Institute produced their nude calendar. Hoping to raise a few hundred £s to replace a settee in a local hospital, they raised over £6m for Leukaemia Research, spawned a 2003 Hollywood movie with Helen Mirren and inspired a Gary Barlow musical. In 2009, the professional stage show appeared. Amateur groups were encouraged to perform it from 2012, with over 500 licence applications that year. This is a story and a play gone global and viral. It's as much a part of British culture as Pantomime, and it was interesting to see it selected by the reliably brilliant Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group for what is often their Pantomime slot.

Audiences were strong for the four performances at Southmoor Village Hall (28-30 November 2024). Perhaps the most challenging session was the Saturday matinee, when a charabanc of ladies from the local WI descended! They seemed to enjoy it. As they should. This talented and cohesive drama group brought expertise, sensitivity and fun to their small stage. Saturday night's standing ovation was duly deserved.

The plot is simple and familiar. Following the death of the husband of one of the WI members, an idea takes hold to replace their typical charity calendar featuring spectacular countryside views with one of "spectacular views of the WI". Not "naked", as Chris, their leader puts it, but artistically "nude". The calendar is printed, despite opposition from WI bigwigs, but then commercial success strikes and evokes fracturing tensions. It's not a spoiler to reveal that the show ends in joyful and poignantly uplifting resolution amidst a sea of sunflowers.

The 11 girls of the original story are condensed to a manageable 6 in the play, along with their autocratic and disapproving president, Marie, ably played as a bossily competitive social snob by KBDG regular Sally Lacey. The six calendar girls are all very different. From the timid Ruth with an unfaithful husband, played with sensitivity by Lucinda Ramm, to the wealthily brash Celia, upon whose disrobing the play's most famous line is uttered: "we're going to need considerably bigger buns!" In Claire Wheeler, KBDG cast a Celia who gloriously filled this entertaining role - in all regards!

All six of the principals followed the playwright's advice to "inhabit" the characters, not just play them.

Emily Eastham, despite modestly claiming in the programme that she cannot sing or play the piano, opened things with a terrific solo performance of Jerusalem, genuinely playing the piano and evoking the indomitable spirit of the WI. Her single-mother character Cora, a vicar's daughter with fondness for drink, cigarettes and vulgarity, is famously photographed sitting nakedly at her piano. As Emily pithily remarked in her biography, the only time in 30 years she had appeared on stage without ANY underwear!

Mary Elizabeth Shewry had fun as the eldest of the "girls", with some delightfully unexpected one-liners ("I'm going to score some crack"!)

Annie, whose husband sickens and dies from cancer early in the story, was inhabited with plausibility by Deb Didcock. This role is the hardest, demanding emotional range as she experiences grief, pride, empathy, frustration and disappointment. Her silent contemplation of the letters which came to the group from other cancer widows was a moment of theatrical power.

For this is the secret of the play's success. If ever the cliché "bittersweet comedy" can be applied to a piece, this is it. The script makes sudden tonal turns, much like the melody of Jerusalem itself, dislocating from major to minor key. One moment the characters are larking about, the next, literally with a line, a word, a look, everything changes. Much of this hinges on the main character, Chris, who enthusiastically leads the gang, but is forced to confront her personal shortcomings as the world of celebrity intrudes. This is a play as much about exposing flawed personalities as flesh.

Paula Eastwood returned to the stage as Chris with confidence, energy and wit. In particular, she delivered the passionate, iconoclastic and deeply moving protest to the WI London Convention with authentic purpose.

Calendar Girls is a female-led piece, but the ancillary men, in the roles of dying husband, photographers and photographer's assistant, played respectively by Mark Padbury, Rob Bateman, Richard Buss and Mike Varnom, supported the girls with impeccable comic timing. Adding to the merriment were cameos from Nicky Harris, (doubling up as a broccoli-specialist speaker at the WI as well as local aristocrat Lady Cravenshire) and Tasha Padbury delivering a neatly pitched patronising make-up artist, Elaine - whose incriminatingly abandoned knickers Ruth found in her husband's car - prompting a vitriolic reaction from the normally timid mouse/rabbit!

Director Sarah Curran did a great job. Not least with precision choreography of the pivotal photography scene just before the interval, when each of the 6 ladies posed individually for their shots - without revealing anything that should not be seen! Marshalling 13 actors, of which 8 or more were often on the small stage at once, was impressively accomplished. This is a technically demanding play. Backstage and production creativity are hallmarks of this group and deftly supported the fine acting. The curtain calls were raucous, as each of the six principals emerged to their individual calendar photographs being projected onto an adjacent screen.

This was a joyful, pacey production, nimble in blending humour and poignancy, and as the director desired, speaking directly of the power of community and friendship. Bravo Britain's Women's Institutes and bravo Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group!
