The Lifesaving Power in Your Veins

Why Blood Donation Matters—and How You Can Help

When I was eighteen my mother had open heart surgery to sort out her heart valves – a very new procedure at that time. She needed lots of blood transfusions. My father and I decided that we would each donate, so we trotted off to the Blood Transfusion centre. My father disappeared. I thought he had bottled out –



then found him waiting, with a note to attend the doctor's surgery to sort out his high blood pressure (something he was quite unaware of). Over the years I gave blood regularly and was on the 'Baby List' providing blood for very sick babies so I felt extra special being able to help in their treatment. Sadly, due to a health issue I had to stop donating at the age of 59.

Recently I went to the Churchill hospital and received two units of blood. Lying there, it gave me time to think about all those people – unknown and unnamed - who have given a pint of blood to help others. I never thought that I would be the recipient but I am grateful to them. Therefore I ask those of you who are fit and able to donate to this fantastic service for one hour twice a year – it could be your mother, father, child, brother or sister who needs life-giving blood – or it might even be YOU... On the other hand, like my father, you might find that you have some medical issues of which you were completely unaware but which need looking into and treating sooner, rather than later. **Jenny Charlton**

Land East of Kingston Bagpuize

I attended the public consultation event in the Village Hall held by David Wilson Homes on Wednesday 14th May. But I hadn't read the advert in the KBS news completely and went along thinking that I was going to see a whole picture of the estate plan, as originally planned, but with the amendments made since the original design was agreed by the Vale of White Horse District Council.

However, it turned out that the main point of the consultation was to gather feedback about the area of the plan described as the Southern Edge Character Area within the development. Please see the areas Indicated by the Red Arrows on the plan.

That's the bit they were seeking the community's views on. Things they have in mind are landscaping play areas for children of all ages. The Cricket pitch and pavilion and links to the existing community will be in the plan.



So, David Wilson Homes have now asked if we can include the attached plan and offer residents a further opportunity to comment and provide their views on what should be

included in the Southern Edge Character Area by sending information to oxfordplanning@Savills. com as soon as possible. Thank you.

David Wilson Homes are particularly interested in hearing KB&S residents' thoughts about the following:

- 1. What type of play equipment would you like to see for 0 6 year olds?
- 2. What type of play equipment would you like to see for 4 8 year olds?
- 3. What type of play equipment would you like to see for 8 14 year olds?
- 4. What type of play equipment would you like to see for 12 18 year olds?
- 5. What would you like to see in the open green space? e.g. fruit trees/orchards, seating, meadow grass, meadow planting with mown grass, wildflower planting, nature trails, orchards, small woodland areas, other.
- 6. Would you like to see any specific accessible or specialist equipment?

Land East of Kingston Bagpuize - Second Cricket Pitch?

A second cricket pitch is planned for our village, have your say!

Those of you who went to the Public Consultation on the "Land East of Kingston Bagpuize" held in the Village Hall on 14th May may have noticed that part of the southern edge of the development has been set aside for recreation and that this will include a cricket pitch.



The Village already has a cricket pitch, so I asked the staff why another cricket pitch? I was informed that this was decided by Vale of White Horse District Council before the current developers were involved and was as a result of lobbying from Sports England. I was also informed that the current developer was open to providing alternative sports facilities, as were the Parish Council, but that the Vale of White Horse District Council planning department were not.

News from The Parish Council

The Kingston Bagpuize with Southmoor Parish Council met on May 6th to discuss key local matters affecting the community.

Annual Meeting - New Appointments, Local Projects, and Community Updates

Cllr Virginia Grant was re-elected as chairman, with Cllr Robert Barnett as vice-chairman.

The Council confirmed its committee memberships and representative roles for the year, ensuring dedicated support across key areas such as planning, recreation, environment, youth, and elderly services. Notably, Cllr Behnoosh Sabah has taken on the role of Parish representative for the elderly, and Cllr Oyebola Bello will serve as youth liaison.

Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council

Key community updates included:

- 1. **Benches for Public Spaces**: The council is exploring options for additional seating at Wellington Way and Orchard Gate, with funding potentially supported through S106 contributions.
- 2. **Neighbourhood Development Plan**: Progress continues, with meetings held to refine the plan's presentation and communication.
- 3. **David Wilson Homes Development**: Discussions are underway regarding potential funding or S106 contributions linked to the upcoming development. Residents were encouraged to attend the public exhibition on 14th May to view the proposals.
- 4. **Flag Raising at the War Memorial**: Volunteers will manage flag displays on significant dates throughout the year, including VE Day, Armed Forces Day, and Remembrance Sunday.
- 5. **Book Swap Libraries**: A proposal was discussed to install two mini libraries for community book exchanges with grants being considered to fund the project.
- Insurance Renewal: The Council voted to continue its insurance coverage with Zurich under a new 3-year agreement.

The Council also reviewed and approved financial documents, the updated asset register, and ratified standing orders and risk assessments.

Residents were reminded of the Annual Parish Meeting on 19th May and the next full Council meeting on 2nd June. All are welcome to attend and participate.

KBS Neighbourhood Development Plan - Update

The KBS NDP Steering Group met on 13th May to review the latest draft of the NDP.

Members agreed on edits and identified the need for additional maps, including one showing the Lioncourt Development site. A follow-up meeting with the copywriter is scheduled for 14th May to continue refining the text. Policies have been reorganised under five headings:

Heritage; Local Housing Needs; A Self-Sustaining Village; Green Infrastructure and Biodiversity; and

Transport and Travel. Appendices are still in development, with more photos needed for sections on Heritage and Dark Skies.

Plans are in place to present the draft NDP to the community at the Village Fête on 28th June and at a public meeting in early July in the Village Hall (date tbc). Notices for both events will appear in the June and July KBS News and on the KBSPC website and Facebook. The final draft will be submitted for independent review following community feedback. The next Steering Group meeting is scheduled for Monday 9th June at 6.30pm in the tearoom at Kingston Bagpuize House.





Recipe of the month

No-bake strawberry cheesecake

This strawberry cheesecake is the summer dessert dreams are made of. Made with plenty of white chocolate, strawberries and cream.

This cheesecake can easily be made gluten-free by swapping the digestives for a gluten-free alternative.

Ingredients: Serves 8 Cook less than 10 mins

- 2 tsp sunflower oil
- 200g/7oz digestive biscuits
- 100g/3½oz unsalted butter
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 100g/3½oz white chocolate, roughly chopped
- 400g/14oz strawberries, trimmed,

plus extra to decorate

- 300g/10½oz full-fat cream cheese
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- ½ unwaxed **lemon**, finely grated zest only
- 1 tbsp runny honey or maple syrup
- 200ml/7fl oz double cream

Nutrition: per serving

• Kcal 523 Fat 42g (of which 25g are Saturates)

Fibre 3g Protein 6g




Carbs 29g (of which 18g is sugars)

Salt 0.7g

Method.

- 1. Brush the inside of a 20cm/8in springform tin with the sunflower oil, and line the base with a disc of baking parchment.
- 2. Put the digestive biscuits into a sealable freezer bag. Push all the air out and seal the bag. Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin, until they are reduced to sand-like crumbs.
- 3. Melt the butter in a large saucepan. Stir in the biscuit crumbs and cinnamon. Press the crumbs into the bottom of the tin. Chill in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.
- 4. Chop 150g/5oz of the strawberries in half from top to bottom and arrange around the edge of the prepared tin, cut side-up. Chop the remaining berries into small pieces.
- 5. Melt the chocolate in a heatproof bowl, either over a pan of simmering water, making sure the bowl doesn't touch the water, or in a microwave.
- 6. Beat together the cream cheese, vanilla, lemon zest and honey in a mixing bowl. Stir in the chopped strawberries.
- 7. In another bowl, whisk the double cream until it holds a floppy peak.
- 8. Fold the melted chocolate into the cream cheese mixture, followed by the double cream. Add more honey if needed.
- 9. Spoon the filling into the tin, being careful not to move the strawberries on the edge. Spread level with a palette knife or the back of a spoon, cover with cling film and chill overnight, until firm.
- 10. Carefully remove the cheesecake from the tin and put on a serving plate. Slice or quarter extra strawberries to arrange on top.

Restaurant Review



The Maybush

Newbridge, Witney OX29 7QD



On a beautiful sunny evening we headed off to The Maybush Pub, Newbridge. We opted for the easy option of a 10 min drive but it's definitely worth considering walking there via Longworth. A lovely walk and maybe a good excuse for eating a bit more. We parked in the car park on site and access was good with no steps.

We had booked, which is only possible for inside dining. There were lots of tables outside with beautiful views of the river, allowing us to watch the paddle boarders in such a picturesque location. There were the traditional wooden tables and benches, and also bistrotype seating under the canopy.

The menu for outside dining is virtually the same as the indoor one . No table service is available outside and one orders from the outdoor bar. We opted to be served and sat in the indoor space which had a nautical theme and consisted of two rooms, one with a fire in the middle which would be cosy in winter. It was busy, and to be honest, a little bit too loud for easy conversations.

They have themed nights with budget friendly combinations and, as Friday was pizza night, we tried the vegetarian one. There are dates for live music and festivals which were displayed on the specials board.

Our attentive and friendly waitress took our order from the menu, which had a range of meals (£16 -£21 for mains) with a limited vegetarian food and ciabattas only available up to 5PM. The food arrived promptly but unfortunately a little disappointing as the panfried chicken was rather tough and overall underwhelming. The pizza was large and tasty.

Next, we went onto puddings There was a good selection including cheese, as well as classics such as cheesecake and crumble, with some available as a smaller half size. Trying to be healthier, we went for the half portion of chocolate brownies and seasonal crumble of apple and rhubarb. Both were enjoyed by us and the portions were reasonable.

The beautiful outlook and friendly staff made up for the shortfall in the meal and it is worth another visit in my view; maybe sitting outside with a different food choice. By Wilrich, two KBS foodies

Marcham Road Health Centre PPG

Are you a patient at this practice? This article is for you

At Marcham Road Health Centre, interest in research is high on the agenda. As part of this interest, Dr Fiona Tierney, from Oxford Brookes University, spoke to some patients from the practice, at an event organised by the PPG and Advanced Nurse Practitioner Carley Moore.

Dr Tierney's approach was to elicit sleep experiences from the patients, enabling her to give pragmatic advice and make suggestions to improve their



quality of sleep. This prompted a fascinating range of sleep experiences, including; the impact of exercise, smart watches, bright light, shift-working, herbal teas and body rhythms.

She explained how she uses three prompts: Lights, Lions and Tools to help us to manage our own sleep. *The Light* prompt refers to the Circadian process and she recommends exposure to light especially in the morning, as this is more effective, and to avoid napping for more than 30 minutes. *The Lions* prompt requires us to ask ourselves, have we done enough exercise, do we have regular meal-times and regular bed-times? Finally, Dr Tierney explained, "it's important that our brain feels it's safe to wind down and go to sleep" which brings us to the *Tools* category that requires us to consider what we can do to make our brain feel that it doesn't need to 'be on alert'. Things that patients can try are: a regular night-time routine, not watching television an hour before bed-time, having a night-time drink or reading in bed. She emphasised, "We're all different so try some of the above and see what works for you".

Le Grand Return by Alan Stockdill

Review of Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group production 24 - 26 April 2025

Just a couple of weeks before commemorations of the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day, it was a poignant delight to see a play set around the 50th anniversary of D-Day. As survivors from the Second World War become fewer and frailer, our connection with that time increasingly becomes one of history and story. This excellent drama group's Chair remarked in her thoughtful programme introduction, that they are "passionate about creating and telling stories the same way communities have done for hundreds of years." It was clear that the four actors and director in this production had truly poured their souls into this tale of revisiting wartime locations and honouring the memory of those who did not return.

The play's plot has a familiar flavour. A D-Day veteran, Tommy, has a yearning to return to Normandy for the 50th anniversary celebration. He enlists the help of his two friends, Alf and Edwin, from the Nursing Home where they all reside, to pursue this improbable project. They form an escape committee, up against a formidable resistant force in the shape of "Matron".

The first Act is set in the Yorkshire Nursing Home, culminating in their dawn escape, finally and rather touchingly approved by a saluting Matron. The second Act is in Europe as they travel through Belgium and into Normandy, culminating in an emotional scene at the war cemetery where Tommy's best friend lies.



The power and indeed the humour of this play emerges from the bond between the three elderly gents, as they banter, bicker, tease and plot together. They are not a harmonious trio and represent three very different wartime experiences. Tommy, sensitively portrayed by KBDG stalwart (30 years!) Mike Lacey, is eager, determined, unwell, and hopelessly naive about his dream to return to Normandy. His co-conspirators did not see active wartime service. Edwin was an officer in the administrative pay corps and Alf was a "Bevin Boy", toiling in the Welsh coal mines.

Recent KBDG signing Mike Varnom brought great authenticity and understated humour to the pompous ex-officer Edwin with obsessive penchant for good order in the form of meticulous escape committee agendas and minutes.



The third member of the trio, Alf, is a simpler soul, and gave Richard Buss great opportunity for languid comic timing and looks of humorous incomprehension. Together the three worked really well, ricocheting the play's tone from comedy to pathos.

The fourth member of the cast - or should that be the 4th, 5th and 6th - is entrusted with three roles: Matron, then a Belgian customs officer and finally Yvette, the owner of the French house where Tommy's friend George was killed in 1944. The script calls for the same actress to play all three roles, thus enabling a running joke about how the Belgian and French women they encounter all remind the veterans of "Matron". In Tasha Padbury, the production

deployed an actress of impressive versatility and charisma. Her matron was suitably scolding, her customs officer notably chilling and as Yvette, she offered a perfect French accent that stayed sufficiently remote from the girls of 'Allo 'Allo!

There were two standout scenes in the production, both in the second Act. First when the gents - definite temptation to refer to them disrespectfully as "codgers" - have a drinking session in Yvette's house, making ever grander and more ludicrous toasts. The camaraderie between them was beautifully evoked, the earlier barriers between the sole war combatant and his two non-combatant associates touchingly dissolved.

The final scene in the cleverly-imagined war cemetery was particularly poignant, as Tommy completed his first, and presumably final visit to the grave. The scene built powerfully to maximum poignancy as the names of actual local men from Kingston Bagpuize and Southmoor village who died in the Second World War were read out and the evocative notes of the Last Post rang through the hall.



Back to Chair Emily's programme remarks - "sometimes you will see something that really does touch your heart or blow your mind". In that final few minutes, we absolutely did. Bravo and congratulations to the cast, director Laurence Brockliss and the whole redoubtable team at KBDG who always ensure their shows run so slickly. Once again, a privilege to be in your audience. *Adrian McGlynn, Banbury Cross Players*



VILLAGE HALL REPORT

The following is a digest of the report given at the AGM which took place in April, after the copy date for the May KBS News.

The last year has been one of consolidation, building on a lot of extensive works and improvements to the infrastructure that started in April 23. The internet hardware has been updated in the hall so there is now a MESH system ensuring that there is a strong resilient Wi-Fi signal throughout the hall which have also made improvements for the Tennis Club Wi-Fi as a consequence.

The Elkins Rooms and Parish Office have been redecorated and have new carpets, a consequence of the leak in the disabled toilet and flash flooding which overwhelmed the storm drains, after rain of biblical proportions in September. We are grateful to a grant from the Parish Council towards the costs of refurbishment, not covered by our insurance.

All of the hirers of the hall are now paying the same hire rates for the same hires and the charging for storage by various organisations has been reviewed and everyone is paying a comparable rate based on cubic volume.

Following the retirement of Alan Atkins as our general handyman, we have built up a strong portfolio of local tradespersons to undertake plumbing, electrical works, building works, plastering, carpentry and decorating. The Trustees were able to show their appreciation of Alan's many years of dedicated service with a small gift at Christmas.

We are grateful to Ian Ashby, of the Drama Group, who continues to maintain the chairs in the hall and has recently helped out with repairs to the hearing loop microphone and PA system.

Additional external safety lighting has been added to that renovated in 2023, and the car park lights have been upgraded to LEDs and damaged lights replaced.

We were without the services of Dawn Cox until June last year, but thankfully Dawn has been able to resume her full duties as our cleaner/caretaker having recovered from her not insignificant injuries.

Victoria Paleit has reluctantly continued in the role of secretary over the past year, and we have had numerous false starts in trying to replace her, as well as being unable to find a new bookings clerk. We thank Victoria for her many years of service. However, we were delighted to welcome Will Rippin who came forward in response to our March 25 KBS News article to volunteer to take on the secretarial role and, ultimately, he will assume the Booking Clerk role as part of a gradual transition in the coming months.

Elizabeth, as our treasurer, has ensured that we are on a much sounder financial footing, but we have had to spend more of our reserves in order to fund the improvements, most necessitated following a Health and Safety Audit. The invoicing for all the hall usage has been streamlined and she is the epitome of efficiency. The amount of work that she carries out is immense. We have the reassurance as Trustees that we now have robust accounts and systems in place that have had the appropriate scrutiny and ratification by an appropriately qualified examiner.

Bookings both from casual and regular users have increased. Autumn and winter exercise classes have become a regular calendar fixture; Table Tennis has increased the length of its Tuesday sessions; Tots Tennis, Fitsteps and Dojang Martial Arts all started regular hires in April. Badminton has added some extra sessions to try and accommodate beginners.

Our commercial hires have increased, as has usage by local and county-based charities for committee meetings and special events.

I am very grateful to each and every one of the trustees for their hard work and support, particularly for enduring some very long committee meetings and listening to me droning on for hour after hour. They all help to keep me grounded. They aren't afraid to speak up and their wise counsel is invaluable.

As for the future: we have plans to explore solar energy generation and battery storage and be a site for EV charging, but our priority after the flooding last Autumn will be around storm drainage and the soakaway close to the tennis courts, where we have developed our own sinkhole. We are desperate to upgrade the main toilets to something more modern. All will need grant applications and fundraising as these are very expensive capital projects and we don't have enough reserves at present to progress large capital projects.

The Parish Council has given us a grant towards the cost of purchasing a short throw Laser projector

which will make us a more appealing venue as a location for corporate training days and of benefit for regular society users. They have also given us a grant towards some replacement tables for the main hall which have been identified as being unsafe.

We would still encourage new committee members from within the village, not necessarily from user groups, to come forward and to become trustees. Our constitution does allow for two further individuals to join us. As yet, the Parish Council has not identified a councillor to become a Trustee following the resignation of Steve Smith.

My final thanks go to all the many hirers and users of the village hall. I thank you for your continued patronage. Without you we couldn't continue as, unlike the majority of village halls in the country, we stand alone as an independent charity and survive largely on the income we are able to generate from hires and rents. **Neil Oastler, Chair, Managing Trustees**

Report from Cllr Lee Evans



I'm delighted to be writing for KBS News as the new County Councillor for the Kingston & Stanford division.

I wanted to begin by thanking everyone who took part in the County Council elections on 1st May. The result of the election in our area was:

Lee EVANS (Conservative) - 1,166 (39.4%) Hannah GRIFFIN (Lib Dem) - 939 (31.7%) John RANSON (Reform UK) - 570 (19.3%) Matthew CARPENTER (Green) - 155 (5.2%) Charlotte Anne ROSE (Labour) - 129 (4.4%)

For me, it's a great honour to have been elected and I'm looking forward to working for the villages that make up the Kingston & Stanford division, including Kingston Bagpuize & Southmoor.

I also wanted to record my thanks to the other candidates who put themselves forward in this election. Democracy wouldn't work without different people and parties setting out their competing visions for the local area, and I'm grateful to them all for having put their head above the parapet.

Beyond Kingston & Stanford, residents may be interested to know that Oxfordshire County Council went from being a Liberal Democrat led Council (with no overall majority) to being a Liberal Democrat majority Council. Making up the opposition are 12 Labour Councillors, 10 Conservatives and 7 Greens, along with several single member parties and independents.

On the Council, I will therefore serve as an opposition Councillor and my focus will be very much on getting things done for our area, standing up for the interests of our community in County Hall, and holding the ruling administration to account to try and ensure the best local government possible in Oxfordshire.

One of my top priorities is to improve the condition of our roads and to make junctions safer, including here in KBS. I know many people have safety concerns about access to/from the A420 at both ends of the village. The Charney Road junction is a particular concern, but so is the speed of traffic entering the village along the Witney Road. I have already raised these issues with the Council and would keenly welcome the views of local residents and Parish Councillors about what you would like to see happen to make these roads safer.

More broadly, as your Councillor I will speak out on the issues local people have raised with me in recent months, including the challenges of over-development in the area and the need for the County Council to deliver better support for young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities.

So, who was the mystery reader of KBS Nature Notes? None other than BBC Springwatch presenter Iolo Williams! Iolo was one of the guides

for Nature Scotland when Mr C and I set a trend by visiting the Isle of Mull. As it was good enough for us, the Duke and Duchess of Rothesay decided to give it a go a couple of weeks later...

The weather was absolutely glorious, the scenery spectacular and the wildlife abundant on our 5-day guided tour. I can thoroughly recommend Nature Scotland (https://www.naturescotland.com/), Ewan and his team, Theo and Klay, were extremely knowledgeable and friendly. How they can drive on the twisting, narrow roads and still spot an eagle soaring over a distant hill is quite amazing. And Iolo was delightful, engaging with everyone and particularly encouraging to the younger wildlife enthusiasts.

On our first trip we spotted Green Tiger Beetles – boy can they move! Then we were treated to short eared owls and a sky dancing Hen Harrier. Not bad – and the cakes provided were excellent!

Day 2 took us south and we were delighted to see my "bucket list" raptor – a White Tailed Eagle. Magnificent! There was an abundance of birds including Great Northern Divers making

their eerie call. We then had a wonderful display of 4 eagles (I have been informed there were 3 WT and 1 Golden) and a raven soaring above the mountains all in the field of my binoculars. The lunchtime soup was delicious.

The following days brought us many of our recognisable garden birds plus, new to me, Redpoll and Siskin. Coastal spots included Curlew, Oystercatcher and Eider ducks – which elicited a OOOOooo from me (and an "I see what you did there" from guide Theo). My favourite bird of the trip had to be the Ringed

Plover – a delightful little bird and so easy to miss camouflaged against the pebbles.

Other highlights included a herd of red deer all attempting to stand on the same rock. I felt they would make a good addition to the Aardman Animations portfolio all jockeying for the best position to spy on us (thank you to fellow tour guest Evelyn Turnbull for the photo). More sky dancing Hen Harriers, more otters and my top spot of the tour – just call me the Osprey Whisperer! (Ok so I thought it was a Buzzard to start with – we all make mistakes). I didn't manage to spot the porpoises or the Minke whale but maybe on the next visit.

Magnus Macfarlane Alice

Alice is real! Did you know that the Alice of Alice in Wonderland was a real person? Alice Liddell was the daughter of the Dean of Christ Church. Together with her two sisters Edith and Lorinda, they would

go on picnics upriver, rowing from Folly Bridge to Godstow. They would be accompanied by Charles Lutwidge Dodgson whose name when translated into Latin, rearranged and translated back becomes Lewis Carroll. He was a lecturer of mathematics at Christ Church and part-time librarian. The girls asked Charles to tell them a story, and so began Alice's Adventures Underground which was published as "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland".

Alice day is the 5th of July this year. The theme for 2025 is Quests and Adventures. Heritage, cultural and retail partners across Oxford will offer a programme of storytelling, trails, games, crafts, talks and tours, mostly free and suitable for all ages. The full schedule is released on 1st June. I have wonderful memories in years past of seeing some of the 150 people dressed up as Alice. For now, look online to see what happened last year.

Where else can you see Alice connections today? Well, let's start with the Alice restaurant in the Randolph Hotel. There is a grotesque of a Dodo in the

Sheldonian quad on the corner facing north: a real Dodo in the Natural History Museum. The Botanic Gardens will remind you of places and plants; the Alice shop, which was a greengrocer where Alice used to buy sweets; and Christ Church Meadows Walk. But, significantly, if you go into Christ Church

dining hall there is a dedicated Alice window. The fire dogs have long stretched necks, like Alice after eating magic mushrooms. To the left of the platform of High Table is the door to the senior common room.

Dean Liddell himself would often be

late for dinner, arriving wearing a white cassock and rushing from the door to his seat saying "I'm late I'm late!" Remind you of anyone? There is even a picture of Charles Dodson himself.

Look out for the next exhibition in Christ Church Library (a treat in itself) of the recently gifted lifetime collection of Jon A Lindseth, who donated a magnificent collection of manuscripts, rare editions and photographs which

explores Carroll's life and work and his enduring impact and legacy. I saw the most recent exhibition. There is even a copy of Alice translated into Klingon – yes, the language of warriors in Star Trek!
