2024 marks our 75th anniversary and the Murder Mystery is to celebrate that as well as to raise money for our lighting fund, replacing our current lighting system (last upgraded in 1986) with an energy efficient, sustainable LED system. It's a huge challenge but a necessary one we are determined to achieve to ensure the group continues for the benefit of both current and future members and community moving forward. Over the past year via grants, donations, sponsorship, and ticket sales we have achieved £13,000 - a sum that was unthinkable to us twelve months ago given we just about break even most years. We've still got a long way to go but are hopeful we will be able to start replacing some of our kit this year and every ticket sold for this production will help us get there.

The Lighter Shade of Pale

Letter from America from Sue Lacey Bryant

Suffering from 'itchy feet'? Finding life in KBS a little quiet? Then a trip to New York City might be just the thing for you.

It's certainly Louder than home but also rather more expensive than moving the living room furniture around, as my mother used to do when she wanted new horizons. A few days in NYC brings new sounds and sights and offers a fresh perspective on life in KBS.

On our month long journey to discover just one tiny stretch of the East coast of America, naturally we took time for a trip to the museum on Liberty Island. The iconic statue is breathtaking, inspiring. The sun catches her gold lamp, a shining beacon.



The tourist tatt belies a real sense of communal pilgrimage as we head out to the island in a succession of small boats. We hear about the reception centre for immigrants on neighbouring Ellis Island. Operational until 1954, this place is central to the living history of many families in the States. They return to it with tales of first impressions shared by their grandparents and great grandparents. After making a difficult and expensive voyage, some 4% were refused admission and deported. Of those admitted to the USA, a third later returned to their native country. It's an interesting history: www.pbs.org/wgbh/americanex/goldman-immigration-and-deportation-ellis-island/



Not surprisingly, looking back to family connections in 'the old country' (wherever that was) is a common topic of discussion. However, my grandfather was American so I'm on a different journey, looking the other way. I only have a sketchy view of my grandfather even though Will Lacey was famous for a time as a Vaudeville performer and American relatives had shared some information with my Dad. So, I wrote to NYC libraries ahead of the trip expecting to have to put in hours of research. Instead, they responded within 3 days, emailing a show poster with a short review of his stage act. Just as in our neighbouring public libraries in Oxfordshire, New York's library staff are amazing. Indeed, counter to what others might say, we found the people of New York unfailingly helpful.

Broadway is fun and Times Square is all about bright lights. The signs proclaim it as a Gun-Free zone - so that's good too. On the downside, I had imagined a faint aroma of pizza wafting across NYC. In fact the

city reeks of weed and

pee. And a mental health crisis is

being played out in plain sight on the subways and in the streets. We observe homelessness at a scale beyond that in Oxford - and if this is an issue you care about here at home, you might want to learn about the work of Emmaus Oxford: https://emmaus.org.uk/oxford/

TV programmes are interspersed with adverts for medicines - drugs for acne, cancer, diabetes, IBS. The ads run on, each ending with a list of dire health warnings. If ever you doubted that the universal healthcare from which we all benefit is worth fighting for, spend a day on the streets of New York and a couple of hours watching their TV.

Every city has its problems though. Despite the downsides we find NYC vibrant and upbeat. This was our second visit allowing us to dig deeper, visit more museums. We made it to two Broadway shows, the Tenement Museum and the Guggenheim. We managed two visits to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. My 'other half' is an afficianado of Vermeer, which prompted our visit in the first place. Meanwhile I'm a fan of Mondrian. For me, his 'Broadway Boogie Woogie' captures the joy and the vigour that pulses through the city.

Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council

Report from District Councillor Jill Rayner: Sewage into Kingston Brook for 89hrs since Easter. Climate Action fund opened on May 3rd – open to all village groups.

Clerk's Report: New goal posts in Millennium Green donated by Kingston Colts.

Planning Applications: The Council did not object to any of the 4 applications being considered: P24/V0232/FUL; P24/V0774/LB, P24/V0902/HH & P24/V0883/S73. Full details of all Planning applications and decisions taken by the Parish Council and VWHDC Planning are listed on the website.

New Play and recreation equipment: Following a meeting of the finance committee in April and scrutiny of figures of general reserves and CIL monies as provided by the Clerk, the Council resolved to add a further sum of £59,000 to the £51,000 already allocated giving a total of £110,000 including a contingency fund as the maximum sum available for new play /recreation equipment. Following consultation with parents and children via the school/Facebook and the annual parish meeting, feedback will be presented at the 3rd June parish council meeting.

Neighbourhood Development Plan: Residents are invited to a meeting at 6.30pm on Thursday 20th June in the village hall to discuss policies and aspirations for inclusion in the application.

S106 ART Monies: 2 benches of the bench trial are now close to being completed. The carved boulders for the Wellington Way public open space are being installed on May 21st.

D-Day 80th Anniversary Thursday 6th June 2024: 2 unknown Tommy statues have been purchased for display on June 6th and thereafter at Remembrance Sunday events. Sorbus Garden Care generously donated one of the statues.

I met with the Health Minister to again push my campaign for better local health services and for our infrastructure to keep pace with all the new housing that is being built. Improving our health services is a key campaign for me and I am pleased the Minister has agreed to write to the local health leaders on our behalf.

I met with the Water Minister to again raise constituent concerns about the proposed reservoir and to call for public scrutiny of the proposal. In December, I wrote to the Environment Secretary about this, echoing GARD's call for public scrutiny and have been regularly raising concerns with Thames Water and the Environment Agency, who I took to Steventon recently where I discussed it with them.

It was also great to welcome the Science Minister to meet with and take questions from our great local science and technology organisations at my latest Wantage and Didcot Science and Technology Forum. I was glad to hear the Minister confirm that the Government will spend £20 billion on investment in science and research this year which is welcome news for our local sector.

In other news, I had the pleasure of hosting a reception at Number 10 Downing Street for people working in our great early years sector and was pleased to bring Julie, a childminder from Didcot who spent 14 years fostering around 30 families, as my guest to recognise her incredible efforts.

Didcot TRAIN works with young people, especially those who are disadvantaged or vulnerable and provides various essential services including youth clubs, mentoring and outreach programmes. They are doing great work to empower young people. Visit their website at www.trainyouth.org.uk.

Tip of the Month from Environment & Climate Group

Some ideas for reducing your electricity bill at home. In a year you could save around: £45 - turn off appliances which are on standby.

£7 - turn off lights in empty rooms.

£40 - by having all energy efficient LED lights.

£12 – if all of your clothes washes can be at 30 and if you are able to do just one less wash in the year.

£50 – by never using a tumble dryer, so just taking advantage of the clothes line on sunnier days could save a reasonable amount.

£12 – with one less use of the dishwasher each week, ideally only running it when it is full (this one saves on your water usage too).

Do all of the above to possibly save a cool £169... which helps to pay for buying those new LED lights which don't need to be bought every year!

Nature Notes the Wonders of the Hedge Wide Web



If you've been out and about along some of the lanes surrounding the village lately, you might have noticed something surprising along the hedgerows. What look a bit like bedraggled white sheets or old lace curtains drapped over individual bushes seem to have popped up almost overnight in a few locations.

There is quite a cluster of them if you turn off the A415 towards Stanton Harcourt after crossing Newbridge and I spotted a huge one along the A420 towards Faringdon, just before St Hugh's School. If you get the chance to stop and look closely at them it soon becomes obvious that these strange apparitions are in fact huge and complex webs, created not by spiders but by moths. Up close you will see that the webs are thronging with their tiny caterpillars. Unlike those spun by spiders designed to catch their lunch, these

webs are produced to protect themselves from the predations of birds which are avidly searching out food at this time of year to feed their hungry chicks. There are several species of moth involved and each is fairly tied to a specific tree host.

At the front of my house I have a pair of Rowan trees and a Spindle. Over the past few weeks I have been watching the parent Blue Tits back and forth to the Rowans to collect food to take back to the nest but never seeming to go to the Spindle tree which is steadily being enveloped in a fine webbing. The deterrent is clearly working for the moths. Each year the leaves of the Spindle are almost stripped bare, after which it is fascinating to watch the fattened caterpillars drop to the ground on tiny silken threads to seek out a place to pupate. Somehow, when the moths have done their worst, new growth including flowers returns to the tree and by autumn there is a healthy flush of berries. Hawthorns being abundant in the hedgerows seem particularly susceptible to attacks and it is noticeable that the hedges that have been intensively managed seem to be those most affected.

The adult insects are all in a group that are termed "micro" moths, many being just 1cm long but if examined up close are quite attractive with tiny black spots on pure white wings, justifying their name Ermine Moths. Perhaps there was a good reason why they were avoided earlier on, for by mid summer when they are on the wing and without their webs to protect them they will, despite their beauty, become a continuing food source for birds and other predators.

Recipe of the month

Radish, lentil & mint salad

Prep: 30min Cook: 15mins

Ingredients - Serves 4

- 50g walnut pieces
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 1 red onion, sliced
- 1 tsp black treacle
- 2 tbsp sherry vinegar
- small pack mint, leaves picked and half chopped
- 400g can green lentils, drained and rinsed
- ½ cucumber, chopped
- 300g radishes, some left whole, others sliced and chopped



Step 1: Toast the walnut pieces in a large frying pan over a medium heat until fragrant and just starting to char at the edges. Tip into a bowl and set aside.

Step 2: In the same pan, turn the heat down to low and add 1 tbsp olive oil. Add the onion, fry gently for around 10 mins until soft, then take the pan off the heat. Add the black treacle, Sherry vinegar and the rest of the olive oil, then mix and leave to cool. Add the chopped mint to the pan, and season well.

Step 3: In a large bowl, mix together the lentils, cucumber and half the radishes, then pour over the cooled onion and mint dressing. Toss everything together and pile onto a serving dish. Scatter over the walnut pieces and the rest of the mint and radishes, then serve.

Restaurant Review



The Plough at West Hanney, OX12 0LN



On a Tuesday evening we arrived at the Chequers at Charney Bassett where we had a reservation. We were greeted in the car park by the owner who told us they had no electricity so wouldn't be able to feed us that night. A quick call and we diverted to the Plough at West Hanney, OX12 OLN. We were feeling peckish so we were relieved they slotted us in. It's a pub with a good reputation and well known for its Sunday roasts.

We parked in the car park opposite the pub. At very busy times there is on-road parking but it may involve a bit of a walk. We were greeted by the very friendly owner and were seated at a nice table in the smaller bar and dining area. It was lively with people drinking and eating and felt snug and homely. Everybody seemed friendly

and animated. There was also a larger dining room, which seemed full that evening, and a covered outside area.

The serving staff were attentive. The menu is compact, with only one main vegetarian dish. The menu was interesting and the meat sourced from the owners' Welsh family farm. I chose smoked salmon mousse, pickled kohlrabi and cucumber salsa. My friend had roasted winter squash, hispi cabbage, chestnuts and butternut squash puree. Unfortunately, we were a bit disappointed by the starters. The salmon mousse, although tasty, was very salty and the squash was rather underwhelming. We did mention the saltiness of the salmon to the waiter and he came back later and apologised. He offered to remove it from the bill which was appreciated and gave us an excuse to have a pudding!



The main courses did not disappoint. My pan-roasted chicken breast, cherry

tomato and Tabasco compote, savoy cabbage and mash was delicious. It was moist and flavoursome, with a good combination of textures and flavours as well as a generous portion. My friend enjoyed the mushroom risotto, pickled mushrooms and creme fraiche which was reported as hearty, earthy and tasty.

Feeling pleasantly full we still went on to try the sticky toffee pudding with vanilla ice cream. It was lovely. Not too sweet, a good amount of sauce and locally produced ice cream. Every bit of it was eaten and enjoyed.

After a lovely coffee, we headed off home back for the short 12 min ride feeling well-fed. We'll go again!

District Councillor Jill Rayner's Report



Can you believe it's already June. Where on earth has this year gone?

Firstly, a huge congratulations and thank you to our Parish Council Committee who once again agreed to give up their time for another year. I take my hat off to anyone who work the good of the community and I know there are so many residents in KBS that volunteer in so many areas.

Climate Action Fund. Please help us spread the word that the Climate Action Fund opened on Friday 3 May to help finance climate-related projects in the district. The total funding available will be £100,000. The size of individual grants that can be applied for has doubled to a new maximum of £10,000 (minimum is £250). Great

news for local community groups looking to tackle climate change and help nature recovery as the Vale of White Horse District Council has doubled the size of the maximum grant available to £10,000 per project from its Climate Action Fund which is now open. Previously the Climate Action Fund has provided money towards a huge range of climate and biodiversity-related community schemes and applicants have until Friday 28 June to apply.

Changes to our garden waste scheme. The Vale have been working on introducing changes to the way garden waste subscription works. Last month began the transition period towards introducing a new permit scheme next year in April 2025. When a customer's invoice is due, they will receive information on the changeover, what to expect, and what they need to do in early 2025 if they wish to continue to receive the service from April 2025.

Police and Crime Commissioner Election. Matthew Barber has been elected as Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley. The turnout for Vale of White Horse 21.94%.

New housing enforcement policy. Our new Housing Enforcement Policy supports residents as well as social housing landlords, private landlords, letting agents and tenants by setting out in a clear and transparent document the housing standards we expect.

Response to joint local plan consultation. Over 1,200 individuals and organisations have provided several thousand comments to the consultation asking for the community's feedback on councils' proposed plans and draft policies across a range of topics, including climate, housing and jobs, environment, community facilities. This will guide planning decisions in the districts until 2041 and consider what kinds of new housing and jobs are needed and where they should go. The comments and responses will be summarised and will help shape the full draft Joint Local Plan that will be published Autumn 2024 before the plan is then submitted to the secretary of state and then examined by a Planning Inspector.

Magnus Macfarlane Oxnaforda

Oxnaforda is the oldest known name for Oxford. First mentioned in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle of 912. So named because there was a ford here across the river over which oxen could be driven. At this period Oxford was one of the largest towns in England. Travel or transport was easiest by water so coastal towns predominated. Oxford is navigable by the river Thames to London and as such grew into an important trading



centre for the middle of England. This association is depicted in the crest of the town

which features an ox over water. It also developed here because it was also a good defensive position surrounded on two sides by rivers - the Thames known locally as the Isis and the Cherwell. The name Thames derives from the river Isis when it met the river Thame, which became Thame-Isis or Thames.



There is a wonderful full-sized statue of an ox to greet you as you exit the train station. However, for 8 weeks this summer there will be an oxtrodinary oxciting Ox-Trail around Oxford of 31 life-sized, cow-moo-flaged beasts (puns out of the way!). The exhibition starts on the 5th of July. In addition, there are going to be 108 mini oxen – some in herds in the City (The picture is of blanks - all under wraps!). This will culminate with all the large oxen coming together in the Westgate Centre between the 6th and 11th of September.

As I write the oxen are at the MINI plant where they will get a final spray coat finish (the same as the MINI itself!), to protect the designs of the local and international artists of the full-sized models and children's designs on the mini models.

Your opportunity here lies on several levels. A walk or cycle round all 31; it's about a 20 km route; walk around your selected few in the City centre; volunteer to be moo-crew looking after an ox for a while in the Westgate (not arduous as no feeding or mucking out required!)

All this is being put together by Sobell House, who as a charity look after 4000 people a year. They will auction off the oxen at the end. There are also all sorts of fundraising options that you can participate in. This is a unique, finite opportunity on your doorstep. 

D-Day PREPARATIONS IN WANTAGE MAY 1944 Joan Weaving remembers it well!

In May 1944, I was 10 years old and attending the Council School, Garston Lane, Wantage. During playtime one day, we all ran to the wall overlooking the road to see an enormous convoy of army vehicles of all descriptions. They came to a halt and the whole length of the road was blocked. At home time, as we walked home, the pavement was blocked by soldiers lighting up small burners and filling their billy cans with tea. We lived down a rough lane off Garston Lane and there was an

anti-aircraft gun – very large – in the field at the front of our house. It was never fired but had a small group of soldiers there, just in case!

I do not remember how long the road was blocked, but just after they left, a large battalion of USAAF (United States Army Air Force) arrived to take over the airfield at Grove. They were there to supply everything their forces would need when D-Day happened. The airfield at Grove is now almost covered with houses.

Wantage at the time had a population of approximately 5000 and from 1939 it went through an influx of evacuees – ferried from Wantage Road station – British and American soldiers in 1944, followed by German prisoners of War, and finally Irish Workers who dug out the infrastructure on which much of Wantage is built to this day.

Joan is now in her nineties, and for many years was a teacher at John Blandy School and very well known throughout the village.

D-Day Memories

The Americans at Longworth Manor – the build up to D-Day 1944. As recalled by Eddie Edney, a young lad from Hinton Waldrist.

Born in 1936 I was barely 8 years old on D-Day. Growing up in Hinton Waldrist, D-Day and the War meant very little to us young ones growing up in the idyll of the Berkshire countryside. I do remember the US Army being stationed under canvas at Longworth Manor across the path that leads from Hinton to Longworth. These soldiers were privates and junior NCOs and were the equivalent of our Pioneer Corps - having very large bulldozers and graders, etc. which occasionally had to be washed down to clear the debris from them... So, what did the Americans do – bucket and sponge? No – they took them to the Ford at Duxford – into the ford itself and washed them there having first made an access by dozing a path to reach the ford....

My other memory is the candy and gum which they distributed to us children – being wartime and rationing, sweets were in very short supply and what was available was not a patch on the US 'candies' so you can guess that we were frequently going along the path to the Manor hoping we would be lucky enough to be given candy and gum!

Talking of food, I also remember the Mess Hall (The Manor Barn). Occasionally we would be given access to it and I recall seeing these very long sausages (American Hot-Dogs) simmering away - and sometimes, if we timed it right, at the end of the men's mealtime we were allowed to have the surplus ones – so you can guess we usually timed it right – talk about Manna from Heaven. To a young Berkshire boy. Of course all things come to an end and one day we went over and the site had been vacated and no one at all was left. Sometime later my parents explained to me all about D-Day...

46 Years of Millets Farm Shop

Did you pop into Millets Farm Shop on Saturday 25th May? If you did, you might have noticed the Farm Shop was celebrating turning 46 years of age! The whole site opened in 1952 and the shop opened in 1978. The Carter family has owned and run Millets all that time and are now into the third generation managing the site on a daily basis. Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group - Behind Closed Doors 18 - 20 April 2024

Kingston Bagpuize Drama Group opened the doors of their Village Hall HQ for a captivating evening of four One Act plays. The four pieces ranged from 20 to 40 minutes, with ten actors involved. Like short stories, single act plays must be crisp, brisk and tight in their setting, characters and exposition. There's no time for waffle or prologues. It's lights out, curtain up and go, go go! That's certainly what this extremely talented and cohesive drama group provided, in an evening offering glimpses behind the front doors of four very different dwellings.

First up, Mother Figure, written by that colossus of quirky domestic dramas,



Sir Alan Ayckbourn. Directed by the artistic colossus of KBDG, Kate Belcher, Lucy, a stay-at-home mum, reveals that she might just have spent rather too much time in her children's company. Played with wit, energy and authenticity by Claire Wheeler, Lucy treats her awkward adult neighbours, Rosemary and Terry, as if they are infants. Sally Lacey and Mike Varnom steadily succumbed



to her cheerfully persistent infantilising treatment, changing from concerned, rather intrusive adults into compliant children. A pacy, humorous rendition of a popular short play, skilfully synthesising situation comedy and farce.

Next up, Housebound by Simon Mawdsley, and directed by lan Ashby. This award-winning drama opens with the dramatic entrance of the two characters - a gun-wielding thug and, within her own sitting room, a bound, gagged and blindfolded female victim. The initial alarming menace gradually disintegrates as it becomes clear the thug, "Bone", is a hapless petty-criminal and his victim, Fiona, despite all her many phobias is very much the stronger. The piece gradually unpicks the personalities of the two characters, with a bond developing, particularly in the face of their shared terror for a wasp lurking in the kitchen. Mike Lacey brought great wit to the gradual revelation that he is anything but an experienced gangster.





The extremely authentic gun he brandishes is wittily later revealed to be as innocuous and useless as he is. Lucinda Ramm, as initially fearful Fiona, charted a clever

performance trajectory from terrified victim to confident superior. The pair worked intuitively together, both physically and in their conversational interplay. Director Ian Ashby cleverly developed the initial violent threat into power games, humour and neat ending. It's a piece that seems to blend Harold Pinter with Alan Ayckbourn and was a very crafted, confident performance.

After the interval, a touching piece directed with great sensitivity by Fiona Eaton. Reminiscing by Charles Dennison, provides just what it says in the title, although with a heartbreaking final twist. An elderly man, James, is dozing in his armchair when his wife, Jennifer, comes in and the pair reminisce about their life together, from first meeting to the arrival of children and grandchildren. It's a familiar, loving series of wistful domestic memories realistically and tenderly portrayed by





lan Strange and Mary Elizabeth Shewry. The pair absolutely convince as a long married, utterly devoted, content couple. Their dialogue delivery

truly reveals the depth and familiarity of their relationship. Both performances were engagingly and freshly authentic. Occasionally their reverie is interrupted by their daughter, Joanne (Deb Didcock), performing household chores. There is of course a final twist, beautifully handled, when Joanne has to gently remind her father at the end that his wife had passed away a few weeks earlier. Jennifer had only been present as a memory. But crucially not a painful one. Instead, a tender, loving remembrance, with no hint of remorse, anger or loss. A truly warming piece of theatre.

And so to the last piece. KBDG took Anyone Can Dance, (written by Sean Baker) to Oxfordshire drama festivals in 2023. Rightly admired and enthused over by everyone who encountered it, the production was also performed at the National Drama Festival Finals in Coventry. Directed by Kate Belcher, with Dan Sears playing Joe and Emily Eastham, Samantha, it was a privilege to see this performed in the group's home theatre. Utterly polished and absolutely spellbinding,

Dan and Emily truly inhabit the roles of a fairly new couple, wondering how things might have worked between them had they met





earlier in their lives. With a finger click and precision lighting, not to mention a constant process of flawless costume changing, Joe and Samantha recreated their younger selves and fictional earlier encounters. Deftly transitioning in time and location, each vignette was masterful, bringing developing storylines and different emotions to the stage with true plausibility. Dan and Emily performed with confidence, skill and absolute trust in each other. There was a depth and fluency to everything they did, from glances to dances, and a denouement kiss that brought genuine tears to the eyes. At the end, there was a pause before audience applause. It was a pause of utter admiration - for the true, rare magic which live theatre can sometimes invoke.

Thank you - and commendations - to all involved at KBDG for presenting such a fabulous evening. There is so much work, on stage, behind it, at the technical desk and in front of house to deliver a production as polished as this - an exceptional drama team at the top of their game.

Dog News

We are excited to introduce the new dog owner section by Anne. This section provides valuable information and tips for dog owners. Stay tuned for regular updates from Anne in our dog owner section.

You don't have to walk far to realise that a large proportion of our residents own dogs, so I thought a regular slot in our village newsletter would be a good idea. We can share ideas for walks, plus hints and tips on anything from dog trainers and food to the best performing

poo bags!

This month a focus on local walks from home. Pounding the pavement through the village is not the most exciting for our furry friends and in summer the pavements are, at times, far too hot for their pads. The field off Wellington Way in Southmoor is certainly useful for a good run around off-lead, if your dog has good recall. The private woods at the back are now more open with some trees being removed recently and tempting for a dog that is liable to run off. This site may in future be developed for housing and cannot be relied upon as a walking area in the long-term.

The recreation ground next to John Blandy School is useful, but smaller and one of course has to be mindful that this is a play area for children, especially when the football nets are up. I have also met quite a few of you whilst walking up and down the old Oxford Road in Kingston and some of us exercise our dogs around the edge of the adjoining field. The proximity of the A420 gives this walk limited value for safe off-lead use.

I am currently drafting a letter to the Parish Council to bring attention to the lack of resources for dog walkers in our two villages. In light of the proposed development to the east of Kingston, one can assume the number of dog owners is only likely to increase. I believe we need a dedicated area of land that is fenced to be used as a dog park where people can take their dogs for off-lead runs and socialisation.

How Are you going to spend your retirement?



The concept of 'retirement' is relatively new. Before the passing of the Old Age Pensions Act in 1908, it was expected that you would work until you died. If you were ill or infirm and unable to work, your only options were to survive on any savings you might have, to rely upon the goodwill of family and friends, or to apply for relief from the dreaded Work House. The first Old Age Pensions in the world were set up in Germany in 1889 and were paid to those over the age of 70 --- an age limit somewhat cynically decided upon given that the average life expectancy then was 45 for men and 48 for women!

The Old Age Pensions Act of 1908 introduced state-funded pensions in the UK. The pension was set at 5 shillings (that is 25p!) per week or 7 shillings and sixpence for married couples. It was means-tested, with the full amount only paid to those with incomes below £21 p.a., and it decreased on a sliding scale for those with incomes between £21 and £31 p.a. To qualify, you had to be over 70 and had to be of 'good character', with each case individually decided by a local committee. Basically, don't both apply if you were already receiving Poor Relief from the Work House, or if you were an inmate at the local 'lunatic asylum', or if you had served a prison sentence over the previous ten years, or had ever been convicted of drunkenness or found guilty of 'habitual failure to work'! Despite these restrictions, the introduction of the Old Age pension is now seen as one of the foundation stones of the modern Welfare State, and it certainly changed the lives of many people for the better. Although few people today would argue that the basic state pension can fund a life of luxury, it does go some way to helping people enjoy their 'retirement' years after a lifetime of work.

With life expectancy rates now standing at 79 years for men and 84 years for women (data from Office of National Statistics), if we are lucky we can often look forward to a much more 'meaningful' retirement period – doing all those things we didn't have time for when we were working or raising families. However, for some people their retirement also brings new problems: reduced mobility, aches and pains, cataracts and poor hearing, and a capacious but capricious memory! This is where places like the Cedar Club prove invaluable. They provide a warm safe space full of friendship and entertainment especially designed for those in their retirement years, where people can sit and talk and make new friends and try new activities. It is no longer unusual to have twenty years or more of 'retirement', and it is essential that we have community clubs where we can make the most of these years – and it is essential that these Clubs are fully supported in their communities.

And speaking of retirement plans...... I am stepping down from the Chair of the Cedar Club at the end of May. It has been a highly eventful six years and the Club has achieved so much since it started in 2018. I'm leaving the Club in good hands and I'm sure it will continue to flourish under our Manager Clare and her caring staff. It has been a great honour to have been involved in the Club, and I urge anybody with some spare time to think about becoming a trustee --- it is a very worthwhile activity and somewhere you can really 'make a difference' in your community.
