### Is what you spend on heating being lost through leaks? Help is at Hand




#### 15th - 30th January • Thermal Camera Monitoring

As announced here last month The Environment and Climate Group have secured the loan of a Thermal Imaging Camera to help villagers reduce their heating costs and 'save' the planet at the same time. There has been a great response already to this idea and so we will be going ahead in January when dates will be offered on evenings between 6pm & 9pm from the 15th to the 30th.

This initiative is entirely free and is offered as a community activity by the village. There are no hidden catches and it is hoped lots of people will take advantage of it. If you wish to book a time slot please send an email with the subject line "Thermal Camera" to kbsenvironmentgroup@gmail. com and include your name, location and contact details someone will get back to you to arrange a time.

All image monitoring will be done from outside and a brief report will be provided afterwards. Heating in the home will need to have been switched on for an hour before the check to ensure there is at least a 10 degree difference with the outside. More details will be provided when booking.

### **News from The Parish Council**



Full Council Meeting 2nd December (Monday) and 13th January 2025 (Monday) at 6:30pm • Swallow Room, Southmoor Village Hall

The Parish Council met in the Village Hall on 4th November and the draft minutes are available on the Parish Council boards and online.

**Present:** Cllr Robert Barnett, Cllr Oyebola Bello, Cllr Natalie Clements, Cllr Brian Forster, Cllr Virginia Grant (Chairman), Cllr Kim Kousari, Cllr Behnoosh Sabah, Cllr Steve Smith, and Cllr Dianna Swale. **Apologies** from District Cllr Jill Rayner.

Minutes of the meeting and appendices on https:/kbsparishcouncil.org.uk/document-category/minutes. **Planning Applications:** P24/V2199/HH. 7 Norwood Avenue, Southmoor OX13 5AD. Proposed front extension and single storey side and rear extension. Raise roof above existing front and side flat roof. The council voted no objection.

<u>Engagement of Planning consultant</u> to advise on (expected) application to develop land north of Springhill: Council considered the engagement of MDP Planning Consultancy at a fee of £1200 - £1500 when planning application submitted to VWHDC. Council voted to accept the proposal. NB: please see additional information below.

Recreation and Play Facilities: Playground upgrade: Council considered the 6 submitted tenders and the proposal from the recreational facilities committee (RFC) as to their preferred bidder considered with criteria scoring and report from Michael Carver at Sports & Play Consulting. The council voted for Wicksteed in agreement with the RFC's recommendation. Details on progress will be given at Parish Council meetings.

**Road safety:** Feasibility study for the Springhill and on the A415 Witney Road to inform on the most appropriate traffic calming/speed prevention measures and what is most urgent. Quote for £2,250 from MJA Consulting (recommended by OCC Highways) was considered and accepted by the Council.

**Neighbourhood Development Plan:** The Steering Group was ratified by Council. Settlement Boundary agreed in principle. Council agreed to the application for a grant (up to £10,000) to cover professional costs of drafting the NDP. The next meeting is on Monday 25th November at 6.30pm in the Tearoom of Kingston Bagpuize House.

New and future Planning applications: P24/V2357/O On November 6th the Parish council received notification of the application by Nicholas King Homes to build up to 249 houses on land north of Springhill. This new application is not on land allocated for development. Despite the PC objecting to at least 6 large planning applications in the village between 2012 and 2022, each was successful, the most recent being the Lioncourt development on land allocated in the VWHDC Local Plan 2031 part II.

The Parish Council believes that it best serves the interest of residents by securing the expertise of a planning consultant to provide an informed, professional and expert response to major planning applications for large housing developments. At the Parish Council meeting on November 4th it was proposed and agreed that when this application was made KBS Parish Council would seek advice from a

planning consultant. MDP Planning consultancy has now provided a draft report for submission to the VWHDC Planning committee.



### LIGHTLY SPICED CHICKEN WITH ALMONDS AND APRICOTS

Menu submitted by Jenny Charlton and Kathy Fletcher. This was a favourite recipe of our dear friend Pat Dando. Every time we cook this we think of her.


#### Ingredients (Serves 6-8)

- 1 tbsp sunflower oil
- · 2 large onions sliced
- 1 tsp ground turmeric
- · 1 tsp ginger
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- · 4 chicken breasts, cubed
- 500 g /1 pint chicken stock
- · 250 g / 1/2 lb dried apricots, halved
- 25 g / 1 oz chopped or sliced almonds

### **Preparation**

- **1.** In a large pan, cook the onion in the oil until soft. Add the spices and chicken and stir to coat evenly. Add the stock.
- 2. Cover and bring to the boil, simmer for 20 mins, stirring occasionally.
- 3. Add the apricots and simmer for 20 mins.
- **4.** Remove lid and simmer for 10 mins until the sauce thickens. Add more stock if necessary.
- 5. Place in a serving dish and sprinkle with the almonds.

This can be served with couscous, rice, or roast potatoes and vegetables of choice. Then enjoy!

### Restaurant Review



### The Carpenters Arms, 132 Newland, Witney, OX28 3JH



After a bit of research to find somewhere a little bit different, my buddy came up with the Carpenters Arms, which re-opened in 2019. Previously a Morrell's pub, it has now been refurbished as a Cambodian restaurant, the first of its kind in the UK.

It is 11 miles from KBS, skirting around Witney (about 25-minute drive). It is open Tuesday – Sunday from 1700-2200 (2300 on Friday and Saturday). There is minimal parking at the back of the restaurant, but there are spaces available on the road – free after 1800.

We were welcomed with a smile and shown to our pre-booked table. The restaurant is smartly decorated in a modern, artistic way with a green plant theme. There is a separate section for larger parties, making the main part of the restaurant more intimate, offering a pleasant ambience with genuine Cambodian staff. We liked the atmosphere.

The menu is extensive with lots of vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free choices. It lists a selection of curries and stir fries and some interesting starters. The only desserts were ice cream or rice pudding, so clearly not a feature! We had some very nice Cambodian coffee.

There was an extensive wine list with other drinks available at the bar. The meals are prepared in the kitchen using fresh ingredients, fresh herbs and vegetables, accompanied with home-made sauces.

I had Amok Kmer (fish curry) and my friend had Vegan Cambodian Kari (curry with chickpeas). The sauces were remarkably similar, very tasty with a mix of spices such as lemongrass, basil, star anise, lime leaves, chilli, and coconut milk. Our starters were Thai prawn crackers.

The restaurant seemed to do a good trade in takeaways. It has a shop in Witney in the Market Square selling oriental foods and ingredients – the Sue Shop.

### Tip of the Month from The Climate & Environment Group

Some of the cheaper ideas to help us be snug and warm at home during the winter.

#### Radiators:

Fit reflective foil behind radiators to reflect the heat back into your room, with a typical pay back of under 1 year. Check they are working efficiently, full of water with no air gathered at

the top. Turn down radiators in rooms you are not using.

#### Stop draughts:

For doors, windows and loft hatches fit draught excluding tape, have fabric draught excluders at the bottom of doors and fit door brushes to your letter box. Cover doors and windows, especially patio doors with thick curtains and close curtains at dusk.

#### <u> Heating:</u>

If your chimney is no longer used, fit a chimney balloon or simply use an old pillow. Santa can use his special word to magically pass through any chimney obstacles!

#### **Insulation:**

Fitting a new insulating jacket on your hot water tank can save you roughly £30 a year in costs and reduce your carbon emissions by about 110kg. Hot water pipes can be insulated too using foam or lagging.

The healthy minimum temperature for our homes is 180 C, Comfortable is between 19 o C and 21oC. Unless you have a health condition 22 o C - 24 o C is generally considered too warm. According to Uswitch, if you turn down your thermostat and hot water thermostats by just 1oC you could save over £100 a year. ### Magnus Macfarlane The defensive walls of Oxford

By the end of the Black Death, half of the population of England had died. At this time, the church owned one third of all the land in the country. It was necessary to educate more leaders and administrators for the church and so New College was founded by William of Wykeham.

Nestling between New College and the eastern wall, there was still a small slum area mostly occupied by highwaymen, footpads and ne'er-do-wells. William made a deal with Oxford council that he would clear these unsavoury characters from this area if he could use the land. The council acceded on the condition that New College would be responsible for the maintenance of their section of the defensive walls. Even today, every three years Oxford City Council formally inspects the defensive nature of the walls and, if they are in good condition, New College may continue to use the land.

Today's most accessible parts surround the magnificent, landscaped gardens of New College with the imposing mound in the middle. The latest inspection was on the 23rd of October. Council members gather at the Town Hall, progress up St Aldates, along the High Street and then up Queens Lane to the non licet (not permitted) gate of New College. The Mayor and the previous mayors wear red gowns, current councillors wear maroon gowns. The



parade is led by the sergeant-at-arms carrying the ceremonial mace of Oxford. Upon arrival at the gate, the sergeant knocks on the door three times with a miniature mace and calls out "The Lord Mayor

of Oxford and the city councillors seek permission to enter, to inspect the city walls". The porter from the inside relays the request to the Warden, who then gives permission, and the door is opened wide to let the procession in. The delegation mounts the stone steps to the parapet and proceeds along a section of the walls (aligned with temporary Health & Safety

scaffolding!).



Once the Mayor has inspected one of the bastions, he is able to announce that the walls are indeed in good defensive condition and that New College may continue to use the land. The inspection party, the fellows and the choristers then retire for refreshments. The choristers sing after toasts have been exchanged.

It was most enjoyable to tickle the character of Oxford and observe this ancient, arcane ceremony joyously re-enacted.

Recollecting that last Christmas we enjoyed a magical performance of 'A Christmas Carol' by the marvellous Creation Theatre company, I idly wondered whether I could unearth any direct link between Charles Dickens and Oxford?

The most important thing in life is to stop saying 'I wish' and start saying 'I will.'

Fancifully anticipating an association with the Debtors Tower at the now defunct Oxford Prison in Oxford Castle, or an encounter with a vicious schoolmaster, the truth is much more pleasing. Instead, the only link I have uncovered is that Dickens, who was an extraordinarily energetic man, always on the move, once rowed from Oxford to Reading. With thanks to travel writer Tom Chesshyre, I learned that Dickens described the journey as "more charming than I can describe in words. I rowed down last June, through miles upon miles of water-lilies, lying on the water close together, like a fairy pavement".

These days any one of us can hire a rowing boat or pedalo for a leisurely trip from The Magdalen Bridge Boathouse. Best suited for a spring or summer idyll in my view, a walking Ghost tour of Oxford seems more in tune for a bleak midwinter evening. We joined one of these a few years back. I recall feeling very cold in a dark alleyway and, later, pleasantly warm in a nearby pub.

Nestled in KBS, I realise we could make very much more of the opportunities to learn about the history of Oxford. I'm contemplating taking a History of Medicine tour from Uncomfortable Oxford in the Spring – when this winter's eternal cough has passed! This tour blends two preoccupations: a fascination for history and advances in medicine. I imagine that a canter through mediaeval plagues, moving forward to the triumph of the first trials of penicillin, will remind me how fortunate we are as we head towards 2025. I hope the organisers will bring medical history up to date to include the remarkable achievement of the University of Oxford, working with AstraZeneca, which by July 2024 had released more than two billion doses of the COVID-19 vaccine to more than 170 countries.

This Christmas the magic of Pantomime is coming to Cornerstone Arts Centre in Didcot, in the shape of Cinderella ("Oh Yes it is!"). There's a further treat in store with Hansel and Grettel at The North Wall, where Creation Theatre promises bewitching characters, mystical spells and more winter magic. To quote Dickens: "There is nothing in the world so irresistibly contagious as laughter and good humour." Sue

### **Keeping well in Winter Months**

Like toothbrushing, there are practical things we can all do to look after our mental health. Different things help us at different times, depending on our preferences, situation and how we're feeling. The important part is to find a few tools that work for you.

At Oxfordshire Mind we recommend the Five Ways to Wellbeing as a good place to start:

- **1. Connect** Connecting with others can help us feel close to people and valued for who we are. Being social means different things for different people Online, sending a Christmas card or chatting at the bus stop, how we choose to connect is up to us.
- **2. Get Active** Studies show getting active can help us sleep better, improve moods, and reduce feelings of stress, anxiety and racing thoughts. This doesn't have to mean running a marathon; a stretch or a walk often works just as well.
- **3. Take Notice** Reminding ourselves to take notice can help us to be aware of how we're feeling. It can also help us understand what triggers our feelings of stress or anxiety.
- **4. Learn** The feeling we get when we learn and develop boosts our self-esteem. Try a new recipe, or maybe research something you're curious about, take the time to learn something new.
- **5. Give** There's lots of research into the effects of taking part in community life. Studies show people who help others are more likely to rate themselves as happy. Fortunately, we live in a village that gives us lots of opportunities to get involved. Or it can be as simple as making a cup of tea for someone. Whether it's one at a time, or finding an activity that includes all five, it's a great place to start. We must all get better at proactively looking after our minds in the same way we do our bodies.


